

Five key moments over a 16-month period offer numerous opportunities to work together.



July to September... for the child, their family, and their school, several important steps have already been taken. The child is enrolled in kindergarten, so the prospect of attending school is now real for them. But there's a whole summer ahead before they start kindergarten. Childcare centres will be saying their goodbyes to babies who have grown up, and the child, their parents, and social circle are all preparing for the big day. At the end of the summer, schools are bubbling with the energy of the back-to-school period.



## Valuing skillsets is...

#### RECOGNIZING THAT PARENTS PLAY A CENTRAL AND ACTIVE ROLE IN THIS ADVENTURE.


- → They are the child's **first educator**.
- → They are the child's **first guide** in the transition to kindergarten.
- → They are important people to talk to and learn valuable information about the child's past and needs.

#### SHOWING OPENNESS AND GOODWILL TOWARD FAMILY ENVIRONMENTS.

- → Their first role is to meet the **child's needs**.
- → Their questions and concerns are legitimate; they merit careful attention.
- → Parental skills are based on different life experiences; taking these into account will shed light on the child's needs.
- → Making space for families in kindergarten integration activities recognizes their essential contributions to a smooth transition.
- → The relationships with school experienced by the various adults in the child's life will vary, but everyone wants the best for the child.

#### REASSURING THE CHILD IN THEIR ABILITY TO ENJOY FACING NEW CHALLENGES.

→ Expressing one's emotions about entering kindergarten is an integral part of the process, and encouraging this is a positive thing-whether it is excitement or apprehension...



### A smooth transition from early childhood to kindergarten:



- A Making room for parents right from the start is a cornerstone of parent-school relations.
- A A relationship of trust between parent and school creates an emotional environment conducive to adaptation and a healthy model of relationships among people.
- Recognizing everyone's skills, backgrounds, and emotions builds a sense of safety and wellbeing toward the new environment of the school.





# Suggestion box 🖗

**Ensure that information** about the start of kindergarten is kept up to date in real time (on the school's website, with community partners, etc.)

**Keep the documentation** given to parents upon enrollment (how the school operates, school entry activities, list of school supplies, etc.) available online, at the school, and with community partners, etc.

**Use school-themed books** to engage the child in discussion.

> Post / distribute the list of community partners that offer transition activities.

Speak positively about kindergarten, using vocabulary related to the child's new world: your class, your teacher, the bell, recess, daycare services, etc.

Drive by or take a walk to the school with the child. Explore the schoolyard.

Invite parents into the classroom, with the child on the first day of kindergarten.

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The 5 information sheets in the Collectively investing in 3–5-year-olds to foster educational success are based on the five key moments in a smooth first transition to school. The sheets are distributed over the course of 16 months and provide information specific to each key moment at the appropriate time of year. They are produced by Réseau réussite Montréal-RRM, which works to disseminate effective concepts, based on a consensus of Montréal stakeholders, related to the transition from early childhood to kindergarten.
